Minutes

1. Welcome and Introductions

The chair welcomed everyone to the meeting, including new members. Everyone then introduced themselves.

2. Research Data Alliance (RDA) data sharing guidance (Simon Parker)

Simon Parker from Cancer Research UK delivered a presentation on the Research Data Alliance (RDA) COVID-19 data sharing guidelines.

The presentation provided background on the Research Data Alliance and the project to produce guidelines on the sharing of COVID-19 data. It also included an overview of the guidelines (including links to the resources), and future developments.
